In 2020, Covid shut down a lot of my social hang outs and I had more time on my hands. I had been working for a long time at Crystal Ball Farm's Dairy and I wanted to buy a car so I decided to look for a second job.

Riverwood is a canoe and kayak outfitter in Osceola. Kevin Carlson was the teacher at the high school so I knew him, and then I met everyone else when I started work there in the summer of 2020. Andrew is Kevin's son and he is the boss. Andrew is really nice and caring. Personally, I think he is great to work with.

When I first started working there, I was on beach duty. This entails getting people from their cars down to the beach safely and into their canoes and kayaks, loading the trailers, and getting people off the river and back to their vehicles safely. I like the physical aspect, like going to the gym and being paid for it! And it is a job in the fresh air which I think is fantastic. I like the social aspect, meeting people and making sure they have a good day, that is so much fun.

Andrew asked me if I was interested in driving so in 2021 I became a shuttle captain. By this time, I had my car and I had been driving a while. Driving the shuttle means I drive up to Interstate, meet people at the parking lot, get people their lifejackets and all the information they need to get to the landing safely, and get them to the river. This adds a new skill and I generally like to do new things anyway.

When I look back, and I think about this a lot, I think about how far I have come. When I was 18, I was assessed as not being able to learn to drive and honestly, my hopes were really shattered. But if you want something enough, you work hard, and have patience with each step toward that goal that

you can take. I had a lot of support from everyone, family, freinds, community, and driving everything on the farm, starting with the mower and moving up, really helped me build the skill set to drive a car. Just practice and trying and believing in yourself. Sometimes, it is true, you can't learn to do something, that is reality, but if you want something bad enough, you'll work hard to get it.

Now Elvis has started working at Riverwood on the weekend. He also likes the physical aspects and he's is in the same boat, in a lot of ways, as I was way back when. I really enjoy working with him and sharing some of the things I have learned and hopefully, that is helpful!

Field work happened whenever conditions allowed. If we got a tenth of an inch of rain, we planted into damp dust and hoped for another tenth of an inch later in the week. Eric and Brendan tried to be flexible and jump on any opportunity to tractor. When mother nature wasn't kind, we rebuilt a shop or repaired a piece of equipment.

To keep cows munching away on slow growing grass we fenced, and fenced, and took down fence, and fenced some more. A special shout-out to Nastia, who honed her inner fencing goddess, building paddocks for young cows to explore, and to Janette and Terra who can carry a surprising number of white fiberglass posts around a 10-to-15-acre hay field.

These frequent fencing expeditions were made possible by a loyal dedicated on-farm crew. Joel made sure the glut of late spring calves received plenty of pasteurized milk, while Travis did the dirty jobs, and Hillary picked up after busy farmers and their wild two-year-old. Aldo kept everyone entertained by encouraging lots of tag and we all got to laugh at his tie stall acrobatics.

We have been so grateful this summer for all our help, from students working their way through late spring projects, to thriving young German milking volunteers, and our friends and family promising rain dances from across the country. Inspired by some August rain and green hay fields and budding sorghum, I will sign off and say, "Here's to adapting, learning new things, and please, some more rain."

Oh hey, the milk truck's here! It went psssss, it makes a sound.



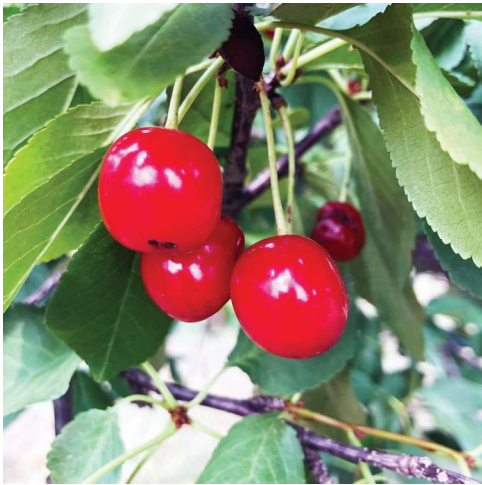

Comings and Goings in the Orchard ~Alex Felt

I thought perhaps I would write this article similar to how Christine writes her comings and goings in each newsletter edition.

This year we greeted new herbs for our teas in the orchard: welcome, hyssop, anise-hyssop, calendula, stevia and peppermint! Teas have been popular in the past years and this year we will try to produce more to keep up with demand!

Greetings to five new sour cherry trees! Expect in the coming years to see more cherry jelly for sale.



We had to say goodbye to our old blackcurrant bushes. The pests and disease pressure that organic orchardists face can sometimes be more than an old plant can handle. This year we purchased some new bushes, but

it will be several years before we expect to see much in the way of blackcurrant products for market. Sorry to our tart jam loving friends! Redcurrant bushes are still hanging in there.

Exciting arrivals expected for Spring 2024 is a BIG order of young blueberry plants. Blueberries require years of tending before they are producing generously, but in a few years time, you can excitedly expect a lot of delicious blueberries in our jams and pies, as well as for fresh eating at markets and for online orders.

As for the apples, raspberries, and grapes? They're doing well enough!

Apples got extra attention from the Youth Initiative High School with weeding, mulching, and fertilizing our favorite trees and they're happier for it. We also were on top of our pest prevention against the codling moth, and are happy to report a lot more 'first' apples ready for sale this late summer and fall— check the online store in the coming weeks!

Raspberries always give us a generous crop from July through until first frost. August is a slow month where we can tidy up the orchard before the apples and grapes are needing a lot of attention.

Grapes, to be honest, receive the least amount of attention from us in the orchard. We prune them, occasionally thin them in the early summer, and are pleasantly surprised when it's a good year. This year, the grapes are happy with the hot and dry summer after a wet early spring.

Each year, our orchard crew becomes a bit more knowledgeable about caring for the fruit and herbs on the hill in community. We hope to continue to remain steady with what we produce, while seeking to innovate a little bit more each year. It is a space with a lot of loving intention.
